Before beginning deliberations, Mr. Heitin explained the Capital Outlay prevailing philosophy. This committee is fiscally conservative with borrowing with the understanding that all funds essentially come from the same pocket and reviews capital requests as carefully as possible. Debt reduction is the primary focus, and this is done by shifting capital expenses to direct purchase. Finance Director, Krishan Gupta provided a spreadsheet which outlines the five-year history of cash capital.

Mr. Turkington provide a brief history on the Town's debt. Until 5 years ago, a formula was used that represented debt as a percent of the budget. Debt service has decreased by 3 percent over five years which helps the Town to afford projects like the high school.

With respect to short duration borrowing, Moody's and other rating agencies look at the percent of retired principal, using 10 years as a benchmark. Sharon is currently at 74.7 percent retired at the ten-year point. This illustrates Sharon's aggressive pay down policy which is viewed positively with credit rating companies.

# **Deliberations**

Mr. Heitin explained that, as done in the past, he would go through the list of capital items presented by each department and take an omnibus vote on all items except those held for further discussion.

# Cottage Roof Replacement

It was asked whether the Cottage roof would be a potential site for solar generation as on other buildings. The roof structure cannot support solar panels and roof replacement will not include structural reinforcement to do so. It was also explained that MSBA has halted all new project grant applications.

#### Civil Defense

It was explained that the land swap process continues at this time and awaiting court approval. Staff does not have a definitive timeline for completion. Chief Wright explained that the project went out to bid last year. Bids received exceeded the funding allocation. He reached out to the low bidder to inquire about the construction atmosphere. It was reported to be a substantial increase, up 20% from last year. The total capital request includes all expected increases plus a 5% contingency. Construction cannot begin until fall at the earliest. Although it is unlikely to fall through land court, there have been discussions about using lot at 94 South Main Street, but this would need to be approved by town meeting vote. Funding is tied to the site.

Mr. Heitin explained that the Capital Outlay Committee has no purview with respect to, and will not vote on, items for the Water Department.
