## History of Sharon

- The Native American Wampanoag tribe hunted and fished in this area for hundreds of years before European settlers arrived in 1637
- Around 1637, Sharon became settled by former residents of Dorchester looking for more fertile land
- Sharon was established as the 2nd Precinct of Stoughton in 1740
- It was incorporated as the Town of Stoughtonham in 1765
- The town was renamed Sharon in 1783





#### What part did Sharon play in the Revolutionary War?

- First cannon cast in the war was from Stoughtonham Furnace (located at what is now Gavin's Pond)
- Iron ore from Lake Massapoag and Gavin Pond was used by Paul Revere and Colonel Richard Gridley to make cannon balls and other armaments
- Deborah Sampson is a famous and beloved local hero renowned for having disguised herself as a man to fight in the Continental Army.
  - She was one of a small number of women to serve during in the Revolutionary War.

#### Three Branches of Government

#### **Select Board**

- Sets Policy
- Manages town operations (often delegated to Town Administrator)
- Appoints certain positions (including Town Administrator)
- Acts as licensing authority



#### **Town Meeting**

- Approves operating and capital budgets, other appropriation of funds
- Approves amendments to By-Laws including zoning

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- Approval of Classification and Pay Plan for government non-union personnel as well as government collective bargaining agreements
- Determines the salary of elected officials

#### **Town Administrator**

- Chief Administrative Officer for the town, responsible to the Select Board for the administration, supervision and coordination of town affairs
- Responsible for day-to-day administration of the town (except schools) and achievement of policy objectives as determined by the Select Board
- Is charged with: Preparing the yearly budget, awarding contacts, negotiating with unions, appointing certain positions, etc.

# What is Town Meeting?

- Acts as the legislative body for towns in Massachusetts
- The Select Board has the authority to call a Town Meeting:
  - A town meeting is mandated yearly between the months of February and May
- If an additional meeting is necessary:
  - The Select Board can call for a special town meeting
  - The public can call for a special town meeting upon the request of 200 registered voters or 20% of the registered public (depending on which is smaller)
- The Select Board must publish a warrant in anticipation of a town meeting
  - · A warrant lists a meeting's time, place and agenda
  - Must be made available at least 7 days before an annual meeting or at least 14 days before a special meeting
  - Both the Select Board and residents can "insert" articles into a warrant
- An elected moderator runs the meeting and declares the results of every vote

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#### Different Forms of Town Meeting

#### **Open Town Meeting**

- A yearly event which gathers all the town's eligible voters
  - Every resident that attends can vote and speak on all matters during the meeting
  - Usually only a fraction of the populace shows up and participates

#### Representative Town Meeting

- Town meeting representatives elected from every precinct to represent the public
  - There can be as few as 45 representatives or as many as 240
- Meetings are open for public participation but not everyone can vote
- Cannot be adopted in a town unless it has a population greater than 6,000

Select Board: Roles and Responsibilities Acts as chief executive body

Develop legislative and administrative policies

Hire Professional administrative staff and town counsel

Set fiscal guidelines for operating and capital budgets

Set tax, water and trash rates

Appoint officials and committee members (only for positions prescribed in the by-laws)

Administer Licenses (Alcohol, Auto Dealer, etc.) and Permits

Enforce town regulations and by-laws

Call for elections and Town Meetings

Hold public hearings on important town issues

# How Does the Select Board Operate?

- Select Board members are not elected by political party
- Elected by registered voters each spring for staggered, three-year terms
- Mainly a Volunteer Position
  - Receive a small stipend
- Open Meetings
  - Governed by the Open Meeting Law
    - All meetings of a "public body "are open to the public
  - Meetings must be posted 48 hours in advance
  - Currently conducted over Zoom on a bi-weekly basis (with some variability)





#### Office of the Town Administrator



**TOWN OF SHARON** 



- Overseeing, directing and retaining responsibility for all department heads under their authority, including recommending appointments
- Attending all meetings of the Select Board and other meetings as so directed
- Attending all Annual and Special Town Meetings, having a voice but not a vote in all discussions
- Carrying out the votes and policies of the Select Board
- Keeping the Select Board informed in matters of financial and administrative concern
- Studying and recommending long-term strategic and capital planning programs as so directed by the Board
- Preparing the monthly Select Board meeting agenda and gathering information pertinent to matters coming before the Select Board for discussion and action
- Serving as public relations officer, processing inquiries and concerns of the public solving problems wherever possible
- Assisting the Select Board in negotiating all contracts and collective bargaining agreements



## By-Laws

- Local ordinances, regulations, and procedures
- Some municipalities are governed by a town charter, however, Sharon's form of government is set by a series of town by-laws
- Reviewed, updated and amended as needed (frequently)
- Changes must be approved by Town Meeting

#### Case Study: By-Law Amendment

- In 2021, the Select Board, voted to establish the Governance Study Committee.
  - The mission of the Governance Study Committee is to review the current town bylaws and to recommend changes in governance to reflect best practices to assure effective and equitable processes for reaching decisions with regard to policies and the delivery of public services.
- The Governance Study Committee recently made a recommendation to expand the Select Board from 3 to 5 members
- This recommendation was proposed by town officials and approved by voters at the 2022 Town Meeting
- Currently, the change is being reviewed by the Attorney General's Office to assure it is in-line with state laws and norms
- Then, the amendment will be placed on the ballot during the annual town election to achieve final approval from the people



# Boards and Committees pt.1°




- Elected and appointed positions depending on role
- Critical role in oversight and governance process
- Specified purpose
- Provides an avenue for public service and participation
- 38 boards and committees

# Boards and Committees pt.2

#### For example:

- The Conservation Commission is responsible for the protection of land, water, and biological resources within the Town of Sharon.
- The Finance Committee's mission reviews all matters that are the subject of, or relate to, discussion and voting at Town meeting, including the Town's budgets, for the purpose of providing information and making independent recommendations to residents.
- The Board of Assessors is responsible for the fair and equitable valuation of all real and personal property in the Town.


